

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Club Industry again casualty of quest for political power at any cost

IT was with some comfort that I read correspondence from both the major parties in the lead-up to the August 21

Federal Election. They were committed to the Club Industry and the status quo. But, 24 hours is a long time in politics - especially when it comes to a Federal Election and a quest for power at all costs.

A promise, a commitment, a politician's word - in this case our Prime Minister's - suddenly means little, or nothing. A matter that was not an issue for any party quickly became a national focus - and the key to power. With a quick meeting and a list of demands, the future of 4,000 clubs and 80,000 employees - and the communities they support socially and financially - were changed, possibly forever.

Ironically, with that agreement, the phones and internet went into overload as the betting odds of Labor being returned to power improved significantly. The agencies took numerous bets from faceless people instantaneously betting any amount - with no regulations or limits. To add to the irony, the print and electronic media published the odds - even encouraged it. Just like they do every day at the races, the footy, even the cricket.

As I reflected on the announcement of an alliance between Tasmanian independent MP Andrew Wilkie and the Australian Labor Party, then looked towards my children aged 13 and 16 with a computer, phone and i-touch sitting on their lap, I realised they had three devices that could allow them to place a bet on almost anything, anywhere in the world for any amount. Instantaneously and all from the comfort of their own home without needing to see, speak to or interact with anyone. I am sure there is a benefit to that but, for the life of me, I can't fathom it.

The media and politicians talk about problem gambling. But, these days, what they mean is "problem poker machines". All other forms of gambling, it seems, are acceptable. But why? Could it have something to do with the social stigma, or class distinction, of people who believe "poker machines are hypnotic mindless devices designed to mesmerise and hypnotise individuals preventing them from making rational and conscious decisions"? More than insulting, I'd argue, to the 99.6% of the population who gamble responsibly.

Problem gambling is a major concern and must be managed. The Club Industry must continuously strive to reduce problem gambling and implement strategies to minimise gambling addiction. The industry has been effective, during the past decade, in reducing the number of problem gamblers. This success is measured and supported by tangible evidence.

The industry always has worked with government to devise and implement proven strategies to address the problem. It is only when governments decide to blindside the industry that issues arise, generally causing enormous damage to the industry and broader community without achieving the desired effect. This latest decision - and its implications - has the potential to irreparably damage our industry.

I wonder what evidence or independent studies were considered in the few hours it took to make poker machines and ATMs the most important issue on the national political

agenda. I'm sure Mr Wilkie prepared a detailed cost benefit analysis considering all the ramifications of his recommendations. I wonder if he considered the following aspects ...

- ➤ There are almost 4,000 registered clubs in Australia, with around 25% trading at a loss and a further 30% barely breaking even
- > More than 10 million Australian are members of a licensed
- Clubs across Australia pay more than \$4 billion in tax annually
- > The net benefit of gambling in Australia is between \$3.7 billion and \$11.1 billion annually these figures consider the impact of problem gambling
- > The club is generally the social hub or meeting place for the community
- Clubs are "not for profit" organisations with any profits reinvested into club facilities, or donated to community and sporting organisations

Problem gambling has been reduced dramatically in recent years through industry initiatives working with stakeholders to implement tangible policies. These strategies and programs are not in place simply to appease political or media campaigns.

Our industry is too important to the social infrastructure of our nation to be destroyed by a knee-jerk political power grab to appease a politician from Tasmania elected on less than 14,000 votes. I only hope that when the election excitement subsides and Mr Wilkie comprehends the human reality of his anti-pokies crusade, that he takes a step back to reassess the consequences. Because this "arrangement of convenience" for the government has the potential to destroy the Club Industry, upturn the lives of the people who work in our clubs and erode the social, sporting and economic support base that thousands of communities around Australia have benefited from for more than a century.

If you want to be dispassionate and look at the non-personal side of this situation, then let's ensure these decisions are founded on fact, data and successful outcomes - not the wish list of an independent who just got off the bus in Canberra. I hear people say ... "I don't go to clubs", or ... "I am not a club person", but they forget that the sponsorship of their team, the playing fields or the meeting room where they hold their presentations is provided by their local club. They forget that the local Rotary, Lions or Probus clubs, Sub-Branch or War Widows meet at their local club. They forget the fundraising event for the latest bushfire or flood appeal, medical research or Camp Quality is held in their local club. They even forget that in most communities, the emergency evacuation centre is the local club.

The Club Industry in this nation is so much more than poker machines. It would have been appropriate for our elected representatives to remember that when they decided the fate of people - not just clubs - in making this all-encompassing policy change.

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Gillard, Wilkie deliver new challenges for industry

It would be wrong for me to say that I'm not concerned about what has happened in the days since the Federal Election on August 21. That would not be a truthful, or accurate reflection of how the machinations of the Labor Government's dealings with the four independent MPs

who now hold the balance of power in Canberra have cast a shadow over the Club Industry. I could tell you that everything will be fine, but that would be wishful thinking, rather than my true thoughts on the reality of what lies ahead for clubs and managers across Australia.

When I sat down to write my September edition column, Andrew Wilkie was a blip on the Australian political landscape. A relatively obscure independent MP, he was battling away on postal and pre-election votes to win the seat of Denison in Tasmania. Today, he stands as one of the nation's most powerful political figures, holding the Gillard Government's destiny in his hands. He was able to extract some powerful promises from Prime Minister Julia Gillard and the Labor Party in exchange for his single vote to support Labor forming government for a second term.

A common gripe about Australia's politicians is that their ranks are dominated by lawyers, union officials and former party staffers. Mr Wilkie well and truly breaks that mould. Before this election, Mr Wilkie ran a rug shop in Hobart with his wife.

A former Duntroon military cadet, he rose to the rank of Lieutenant Colonel and worked for US defence giant Raytheon. He continued his defence career as an intelligence analyst with the Office of National Assessment. In 2003, he caused a huge storm when he resigned and spoke out against the Howard Government on the Iraq war, saying there was no intelligence to indicate Saddam Hussein had weapons of mass destruction.

Mr Wilkie then ran against Mr Howard for the Greens in the seat of Bennelong in 2004. This was a remarkable transformation for a man who was once a young Liberal. He also ran for the Greens on their Tasmanian Senate ticket in 2007. He was unsuccessful and resigned from the party in 2008, criticising them for a lack of professionalism.

It would be fair to say that Mr Wilkie has few - if any friends - in the secret service or the Greens.

That Mr Wilkie chose rebuilding the Royal Hobart Hospital and problem gambling as the main planks of his agenda in negotiating with the Labor Party is not a problem for me. It's one of those "I may not agree with your opinion, but will defend your right to have your say" situations. Mr Wilkie obviously feels strongly about the issue of problem gambling strongly enough to hold the Federal Government, and the nation, to ransom to make his point.

Something that bothers me about Mr Wilkie's crusade is his admission in an ABC 7.30 Report interview that he had his problem gambling "epiphany" just 18 months ago. And that's not so much of a problem either, except that through the efforts of governments, community agencies and the associated industries, problem gambling nationally has fallen to less than 0.5% in recent years. This is documentary evidence achieved through fact-based research and strategies formulated through regulated experience. That is one of the lowest problem gambling levels in the world and it has been achieved through responsible, thoughtful strategies designed to help people tackle their gambling addiction.

One thing that does disturb me deeply is that the leader of our nation is able to turn her back on a written agreement with

the Club Industry - signed less than four weeks before polling day. Ms Gillard and her Government wrote that the industry had the ALP's support for its position on problem gambling. Nothing would change without consultation with the industry through Clubs Australia. There was consensus about precommitment technology and how it would be implemented and that limiting access to ATM machines in clubs and hotels was not a viable solution to solving the problem gambling issue. But all of that counted for nothing - particularly the piece of paper it was written on - when it came down to the vote that would deliver government - and power - to run the country.

I have, during my time in this chair, criticised both sides of politics for short-sighted policy that lacks common sense and a worthwhile outcome. CMAA members voiced their opinion in Zone meetings that I was pro-Labor when I criticised the Howard Government for its draconian WorkChoices legislation that delivered so many terrible outcomes for those same club managers around Australia. I was playing the ball - not the man. The nation essentially elected the Rudd Government in 2007 on an anti-WorkChoices protest vote. I'm sure I'll attract criticism from Labor supporters when I say that this deal with Andrew Wilkie is bad for Australia - not just the Club Industry.

Problem gambling is being addressed and tackled by government and non-government agencies working with hospitality industry peak bodies and I speak for all levels of the industry in saying our ambition is 0% problem gambling in Australia.

I wonder if when Ms Gillard, during the election campaign, "cosied up" to big Barry Hall for the photographers after her beloved Western Bulldogs had won another game on their way to the AFL finals series that she considered that the Bulldogs were there - like almost every other AFL club - thanks to the support of a licensed club or hotel running poker machines? - See story on P52.

I wonder if when she turned up for a photo opportunity during August with a group of kids playing netball, football or hockey that they were probably standing on a field provided or supported by a local club or pub with poker machines?

I wonder if she took time to look into the faces of those kids and realise that so many of them could not afford to play their sport without the financial backing of their local club or pub?

Based on her treatment of the Club Industry in her grab for power at all costs, I think not. And that's what is so concerning about all of this grandstanding about pre-commitment technology and ATM withdrawal limits. I really did expect more from Ms Gillard and her government, given a second chance. I expected that the letter Ms Gillard signed on behalf of the Labor Party would be the bond that allowed the Club Industry to continue doing its work in communities around Australia. That the industry could continue to work with federal and state governments in further refining and improving the problem gambling strategies that have delivered such an impressive reduction in a difficult challenge.

I can say hand on heart that I remain optimistic that the industry will survive whatever Ms Gillard, Mr Wilkie and Senator Xenophon have in mind. Australians love their clubs ... what those clubs mean for them when it comes to entertainment, sport and community. Clubs are where people go to relax, have fun, have a punt - and forget about politicians.

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CMAA builds on ACE Awards partnership



The 2009 awards dinner also



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

The CMAA has agreed to provide administrative support for the next three years so the ACE can continue to recognise the achievements of club performers throughout Australia.


The CMAA met with the ACE Committee recently and it was agreed that the Awards format would change to a calendar year, rather than the previous financial year.

The 2010 Awards Dinner will be presented at Canterbury Hurlstone Park RSL Club on Wednesday, March 9. 2011.

These awards will be for achievements in the 2010 calendar year and not for a fiscal year as previously designated in the qualification process.

The ACE Awards was founded in 1998 when it was acknowledged that Club Industry entertainers were not being recognised by other entertainment awards.

Terry said the CMAA and ACE Awards



committee hoped this venture would encourage more clubs and their management to be involved in the nomination and voting process.

"The CMAA and ACE Awards Committee are very mindful of the support of the industry and club sponsors and will be working to expand this group," he said. "The ACE Awards would not have started - or had continued success - without the support of the entertainers and entertainment business organisations. We are confident this format and timeframe will have their continued support."

CMAA Federal President Bill Clegg said that since the ACE Awards were established, significant change has taken place in club entertainment and it was time to reflect those changes in the organisation and structure of these major awards.

"As the Awards are totally club-based, it is envisaged that the association with the CMAA will facilitate more involvement of registered clubs and their management in the nomination and voting procedures," Bill added. "Without the continued support of entertainers and entertainment business organisations the awards would have no base."

Peter Byrne and Australia's finest compere Paul Martell voiced their support for the change of format and CMAA support of the event. Paul is well known in club entertainment but also has been the man with the microphone at almost all of the CMAA's major events for decades.

"People in the industry love to be acknowledged for their work and their contribution to the ongoing success of the entertainment business." Paul

John's indomitable courage inspires Jake's ambition

It's not unusual for a father to inspire his children to pursue a life or work ambition.

Like lots of young people, Jake Farragher was inspired by his first grade football star dad, John.

Jake got as far as the Toyota Cup team with the Cronulla Sharks in the National Rugby League.

But Jake's inspiration didn't come specifically from John success on the football field, in fact he never saw John play a game. It came from his father's courage and dignity in the face of overwhelming adversity.

Just after kick-off, playing for his beloved Penrith Panthers against Newtown at Henson Park on May 28. 1978, John Farragher's life changed forever. A scrum collapsed on John and the big, powerful footballer has never walked again. His dream of moving from Gilgandra to the city to fulfil his football ambition ended in a tragic mishap. John has been confined to a wheelchair since that moment but his spirit and passion for life remains unbroken.

Jake, who still lives with his father a few hundred metres from Penrith Panthers Leagues Club, was born 10 years after John's injury and watched his father battle courageously through each day in his wheelchair.

While Jake played and loved his seasons of rugby league with his mates, it was the Panthers club's support for his father beyond his injury that inspired Jake to undertake studies in occupational health and safety. He worked as a labourer during his football and kayak training

years to build his body for a potential professional football career. But, as soon as he decided the game's top level was not for him, Jake turned to study and a career in OH&S.

"Every day I experienced dad's world and understood very early on in life just how important it is for people to be supported once something significant changes their lives," Jake said. "The Panthers have been remarkable in supporting John, making it possible for him to work and wake up to a challenge, something enjoyable and worthwhile every day.

"My life with dad helped me choose to work in the OH&S field and I enjoy being able to help people - whether it's a business or an individual - with

the importance and corporate responsibility of ensuring all aspects of OH&S are covered."

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Wilkie's gamble set to backfire on clubs, jobs, communities

"This is a good afternoon for me and a great afternoon for Australia." The words of Tasmanian independent MP Andrew Wilkie on September 2, admitting he took a big gamble by declaring his early support for Labor in the power play following the 2010 Federal Election.

It has also proved to be a big gamble for the Club Industry in Australia with Mr Wilkie's support for Prime Minister Julia Gillard and the Australina Labor Party hinging on two key issues - funding for the Royal Hobart Hospital and new gambling restrictions on poker machines across Australia.

Mr Wilkie said he had a commitment in writing from Ms Gillard that she would ask state governments to adjust their gaming laws to make the changes. "If states did not agree, she would look for a legislative way to force them through," Mr Wilkie said. "This is unprecedented in this country."

The Member for Denison's vote - along with the support of NSW independent MPs Tony Windsor and Rob Oakeshott - was enough to prompt Prime Minister Gillard to dump her party's pre-election commitment to the Club Industry on recommendations stemming from the Productivity Commission's Inquiry Into Gambling In Australia.

It was an inquiry that moved from updating important relevant national gambling data to a problem gambling crusade and poker machine witch-hunt. The Commission recommended an easing of legislative restriction on the unrestricted and unlegislated online gambling business.

Federal and State governments had committed to certain aspects of the Commission's Final Report, but Mr Wilkie's vote and associated insistence on a return to the Commission's agenda, prompted Ms Gillard to turn her back on her written commitment to the Club Industry in the Labor Party's quest for the critical 76th House of Representatives vote that would restore the Government to power for

another three years.

Mr Wilkie's unprecedented power and position was delivered on less than 18,000 votes.

The former intelligence officer turned whistleblower got \$340 million out of the Government to rebuild Royal Hobart Hospital and extracted tough new anti-gambling measures, including an agenda to deliver pre-commitment technology in all poker machines and a \$250 per day limit on cash withdrawals from ATMs in clubs and hotels.

Ms Gillard promised to introduce mandatory pre-commitment technology by 2014.

None of these new problem gambling measures will apply to Australia's casinos.

Mr Wilkie said he was still coming to terms with the importance of the role he now had, after grabbing what was considered a safe Labor seat. "It is obviously a seismic shift in Tasmanian politics and I am well aware that I have been elected on a platform of equity for southern Tasmania and for Denison," he said.

The Club Industry responded swiftly and angrily to the machinations between the Gillard Government and the independents - particularly Mr Wilkie's position.

Clubs Australia has expressed the industry's strong opposition to these policies to senior government officials and has sought confirmation of the Federal Liberal-National Coalition's position on gambling policy.

Clubs Australia stated that a decision to legislate mandatory pre-commitment technology and severely cap ATM withdrawals was totally unacceptable as both measures were unproven as a means of assisting problem gamblers and uncosted in terms of implementation and revenue lost to not-for-profit clubs.

In the first week of the election campaign, Clubs Australia wrote to Prime Minister Gillard and Coalition Leader Tony Abbott seeking their party position on key the Club Industry issues of taxation and problem gambling, which have received significant attention due to the Productivity Commission's inquiry and the Henry Review of Taxation. The industry received a bipartisan response in recognising the important economic and social role of clubs. Also, the major parties committed to adopting a similar approach to developing gambling policy in Government.

Long-time anti-pokies campaigner South Australian Senator Nick Xenophon said the announcement of the agreement was a "historic day". Senator Xenophon was one of the people who counselled Mr Wilkie during his power-broking negotiations with the ALP.

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Wilkie's Windfall

- > \$100 million to build a new women's and children's wing at the Royal Hobart Hospital starting this year
- > \$240 million to help rebuild the Royal Hobart Hospital on its existing site, including the cost of relocating Hobart Private Hospital

Industry reacts angrily to ambush

The Club Industry and club managers have hit out at new hard-line restrictions on poker machines aimed at saving chronic gamblers from themselves.

Andrew Wilkie's deal with Labor will introduce a raft of tough new measures, including limiting withdrawals from club ATMs to \$250 a day and new "smartcard" precommitment technology that restricts the amount punters can gamble.

Clubs Australia has slammed the move, saying Prime Minister Julia Gillard had broken a written promise to 4,000 clubs that she would consult them before making any changes to poker machine laws.

Clubs Australia Executive Director Anthony Ball said the industry was fully supportive of harm-minimisation measures that are tested, proven and don't punish responsible gamblers. "At a time when crucial discussions were occurring regarding who should be Australia's next Prime Minister, Andrew Wilkie was telling our leaders that a person could lose \$15,000 in one hour

on one machine," Mr Ball said. "The Productivity Commission stated that the most a person could lose in an hour is \$1,200 - even this requires they bet the maximum \$10 each time, that they play a new game every three seconds and never win a dollar. It's clear that Mr Wilkie hadn't bothered to read the most exhaustive report on problem gambling in Australian history."

In his "Executive Perspective" column (P10) in the edition of CMA Magazine, CMAA Federal Vice President and Castle Hill RSI Group General Manager David O'Neil, ACCM, said ... " A promise, a commitment, a politician's word - in this case our Prime Minister - suddenly means little, or nothing. A matter

that was not an issue for any party quickly became a national focus - and the key to power. With a quick meeting and a list of demands, the future of 4,000 clubs and 80,000 employees and the communities they support socially and financially - were changed, possibly forever."

CMAA Executive Officer Terry Condon, CCM, said the Club Industry's position has always been for voluntary precommitment, so that people have the

choice. "Compulsory pre-commitment will absolutely decimate the Club Industry and that's why we're jumping up and down about the agreement that Gillard has signed with Wilkie. This is not about problem gambling, it's about anti-gambling. Their focus is to stop gambling completely." Griffith Ex-Servicemen's Club CEO



and CMAA Riverina Murray Zone President Gus Lico, who oversees more than 180 machines at two clubs in the Riverina capital, said the new approach was an "attack on personal freedoms" and would seriously hurt the notfor-profit clubs. "People should be able to control their own destiny. There's no difference between

someone problem gambling then there is someone problem shopping," he said. "Where do you stop putting restrictions on people? In the end, it comes down to personal responsibility. We [clubs] don't go out to get individuals to spend money on pokies. They are there for everyone and it's a form of entertainment and it's up to gamblers to control what they do." Mr Lico said there were already strict measures in place to monitor and control problem gamblers in local clubs.

Hexham Bowling Club CEO, CMAA members and ClubsNSW state councillor for Newcastle and Hunter Valley Jon Chin says that Labor's punt on Andrew Wilkie is a poke in the eye for the Club Industry. "The Government and the Coalition are well aware that the rate of problem gambling in Australia has been halved over the past decade and stands at less than 0.5% of all adults," he wrote in a newspaper article. "This success obviously doesn't sit well with the political ambitions of the anti-gambling lobby and, sadly, is never acknowledged."

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Our political playmakers spin the wheel on pre-

The 2010 Federal Election has unearthed yet another political crisis that encompasses the hospitality industry and clubs in particular. Recently elected Tasmanian independent MP ANDREW WILKIE has delivered a minority Government to the Labor Party by extracting several key commitments from Prime Minister JULIA GILLARD. Desperate to cling to power, Ms Gillard and the ALP has bowed to Mr Wilkie's demands on problem gambling measures including precommitment technology and ATM withdrawals in club being limited to \$250 daily. The Victoria Government has been working towards its own pre-commitment policy and technology. KATIE CINCOTTA examines the impact and consequences for gamblers and the Club Industry ...

Installing pre-commitment technology on poker machines has been on Government agendas for several years, but it took a hung Parliament as a result of the August 21 Federal Election to put it squarely in political

Tasmanian independent MP Andrew Wilkie swung his balance of power in favour of Labor rule under Julia Gillard - but not without a pact on poker machines.

Mr Wilkie's agreement with Ms Gillard requires the Government to commit

with the recommendations of the Australian Productivity Commission's Report Into Gambling In Australia, that recommends a system where players could volunteer to set themselves spending limits.

Club Managers Association Australia Executive Officer Terry Condon, CCM, savs one of the most critical elements of the pre-commitment system is whether the technology imposed is voluntary or mandatory for the player.

Mr Condon says even in the best-case scenario, compulsory precommitment is likely to swipe 20% off the playing deck.

"Our position has always been for voluntary pre-commitment - so that people have the choice," Mr Condon added. "Compulsory pre-commitment will absolutely decimate the Club Industry. That's why we're jumping up and down about the agreement that Gillard has signed with Wilkie."

The Member for Denison also demanded ATMs in gaming venues have a maximum withdrawal limit of \$250 - a measure that excludes casinos - and that the Government establishes a Select Committee on Gambling that would include antipokies advocates including Mr Wilkie and South Australian independent Senator Nick Xenophon.

The CMAA's position is that those measures will do little to impact on problem gamblers, who now make up less than 0.5% of the population.

"Take the ATMs out of clubs and pubs and problem gamblers will simply find a way around that," Mr Condon says. "And, why is it that casinos are always excluded? There are more problem gamblers in casinos than in any club or pub in the country."

Mr Wilkie's deal is set to commence in 2012, with the full scheme taking effect in 2014 - a staged release that's also in line with the Victoria Government's intentions to make a pre-commitment regime mandatory for all "next generation" gaming machines from 2010 - and in all gaming machines from 2013.

The Victoria Government has outlined its preferences and a suggested timeline in its 62-page Pre-Commitment Consultation Paper that called for industry submissions by September 20.

Its intentions, as outlined to Parliament, are: "to link all gaming machines in the state so that once a limit has been reached, the player will be prevented from playing any gaming machine for a break-in-play period." This system would take effect from 2015.

Without server-based gaming, which connects all machines to a central server, pre-commitment can't keep players in check. Once they've reached their prescribed limits, there's nothing to stop them from simply jumping onto another machine.

Of course, one of the main barriers to the proposed server-based gaming system is cost, with gaming manufacturers estimating it would require hundreds of millions of dollars to make the hi-tech transition.

The Government is fully aware of the financial impediments, citing in its paper that: "it will be conditional on the cost of implementation not being prohibitive to individual venues."

Terry Condon is adamant this latest round of anti-gambling measures won't help gambling addicts and will only serve to further alienate recreational gamblers.

"This is not about problem gambling... it is about anti-gambling," Mr Condon said. "Their focus is to stop gambling completely.

"The problem gambler won't be affected ... it will be the recreational player who will say: 'Why should I

have to pre-commit to \$20 or \$100? I want to make my own choices. I don't want someone telling me what to do' ... and they probably won't bother gambling at all."

He says that in the past two decades, the hospitality industry has worked hard to bring the problem gambling rate down from around 3.2% to less than 0.5%, which in Victoria amounts to 28.745 adults.

"We've worked hard to bring that figure down," Mr Condon says. "And to see Wilkie on the 7.30 Report saying that he realised 18 months ago that we had a problem, it shows he's got no credibility whatsoever."

The CMAA supports the Gaming Technologies Association (GTA) submission to the Victorian Government's Pre-Commitment Consultation Paper that recommends ... "Phase 1 should be that players should voluntarily pre-commit and changes should be implemented within each machine's software and. as this is a relatively untested measure, the Government should evaluate whether this measure has met its objectives and not have unintended consequences before making further changes. The CMAA has always supported evidence-based gaming reforms that assist the small minority of people that have a problem with gambling and considers the needs of the recreational gamblers who do not have a problem with gambling and play gaming machines responsibly."

Introducing compulsory precommitment technology without researching its effectiveness would simply be reckless, Mr Condon added.

"No matter what, you'll always have a percentage of people with problems and addiction," he said. "You'll never completely rid that from society but we've worked very hard with state Governments over many years to see problem gambling numbers significantly reduced where other forms of addiction have steadily increased. But you can't just go along with ad-hoc ideas that have not been fully tested that risk decimating the whole hospitality industry."

NSW considers uniform ban on outdoor smoking

The NSW Government is considering a state-wide ban on smoking in outdoor areas such as alfresco dining areas and children's playgrounds following lobbying by local councils and health groups.

The new five-year NSW Tobacco Strategy - yet to be approved by the NSW Cabinet - is believed to recommend the introduction of uniform anti-smoking laws in crowded outdoor areas such as concerts, markets and shopping malls.

Half of all NSW councils now have some sort of ban on smoking in outdoor areas, up from 38% last year, and 18% in 2007, a recently released Heart Foundation report finds. However, the rules vary between suburbs, with neighbouring councils implementing smoke-free policies in a piece-meal fashion since Manly Council became the first jurisdiction in the country - and only the second in the world, behind Los Angeles - to legislate a smoking ban on beaches in May 2004. The Heart Foundation said the current situation, where smoking is banned on Bondi and Balmoral beaches, but allowed at Coogee and

Cronulla, was "ridiculous". Chief Executive Tony Thirlwell said the foundation was part of a coalition, including the NSW Cancer Council and the Local Government and Shires Associations that had been advocating a state-wide approach since 2006. "While we haven't received any details about proposed legislation, we would welcome a move that bring us into line with other states and protects all NSW residents from harmful second-hand smoke," he said. The Minister assisting the Minister for Health (Cancer) Frank Sartor said smoking rates had dropped by 5% to 17.2% since 2003, due in part to the landmark Smoke-Free Environment Act introduced in 2000. "We are about to release a tobacco strategy which aims to further reduce smoking to 13.5% by 2016 and 10% by 2020," he told Parliament.

The Minister's representative confirmed that legislation prohibiting smoking in outdoor areas was part of a range of policies being considered by Cabinet.

The laws would be similar to those introduced in Queensland.

Bligh under fire for alcohol-fuelled violence reforms

line workers, who were fed up

Oueensland Premier Anna Bligh has been accused of going soft on alcohol-fuelled violence after refusing to wind back club and hotel trading hours.

The initiative was the key plank of a parliamentary inquiry into the issue, launched following a media investigation - "Punch Drunk" - and had widespread support from frontdealing with weekend violence. But licensees have welcomed the State Government announcement of a two-year trial to ban problem patrons, make free water mandatory and boost police numbers during peak times as part of pilot projects in Townsville, Gold Coast and Fortitude Valley entertainment

precincts. The Government also proposed better supervised taxi zones and more support services. Premier Bligh said the trial would be evaluated and, if it didn't work, trading hours would be revisited. "We'll have a really good look at it, but if it doesn't work, we won't hesitate to move on those hours," she said.

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Casino staff roll dice

Thousands of Crown Casino staff could be on strike during Melbourne's Spring Racing Carnival as part of an industrial campaign for better pay. Crown staff are voting on the possible strike action in coming weeks after Fair Work Australia approved the ballot. Staff are seeking a 13.5% pay increase over three years and have rejected Crown's 11% offer. Liquor Hospitality and Miscellaneous Union State Secretary Jess Walsh said Crown had posted a \$300 million profit and could afford the increase. She said any strike action would involve dealers, food and beverage staff and gaming staff. "Members should be voting over the next few weeks, so the industrial action would occur in early October - it probably lines up with the Spring Racing Carnival," Ms Walsh said.

The NSW Police Union wants tougher restrictions on late-night drinking spots. Officers said they were sick of being assaulted, kicked, punched and spat on, and decided to make a stand. NSW Police Association President Scott Weber said he'd had enough. "The level of alcoholrelated violence around NSW every weekend is nothing short of disgraceful," he said. Tax office waives sports club's debt

An Australian Taxation Office last-minute decision has thrown a lifeline to the by the struggling Adamstown Rosebud Sport and Recreation Club. The ATO has forgiven an outstanding tax debt to offer the renewed hope of survival. Rosebuds signed a deed of company arrangement with disgraced liquidator Stuart Ariff as administrator in 2005. However, it was not until last year that the club found \$192,000 paid to Ariff had allegedly not been passed on to the club's creditors, as specified in the deed. Club President Ron Williams said the police had been contacted over the alleged discrepancy, which he had feared would sink the club if the money had to be paid twice. "At a creditors' meeting, the Australian Tax Office has agreed with our other major creditor, the Department of Lands, to forgive our debts that we thought we had paid through Stuart Ariff," Mr Williams said.

Cowboys battling on the field but kicking goals

The Townsville-based North Queensland Cowboys are suffering from a lengthy run of forgettable seasons.

This year, they again finished near the bottom of the NRL ladder.

Their licensed club has faith in the Cowboys' future, however.

It's a faith backed by a strong vested interest.

The Cowboys Leagues Club actually took over ownership of the team in

Now, multi-million dollar plans are in place to boost the fortunes of both entities.

Club General Manager Joe Kelly explained that the plans were also in response to the commercial developments taking place in the Townsville city centre.

The Cowboys' current licensed club premises are located in Townsville CBD's Flinders Street Mall, from where the club has been trading successfully since June 2001.

But the club is now moving on literally. It is planning to re-locate to a 2.5 hectare freehold site at Mount

Louisa, a suburb about 8km to the north-east.

"The board decided that with future development of the city and, as traffic flows increased, the CBD location would not suit a licensed club in the future," Joe said.

"Studies also indicated that a smaller proportion of our members reside in the CBD itself and that by moving closer to the suburbs of Townsville we will obviously move closer to our members."

In a spirit of true democracy, the club sought the opinion of its members to

the plan and asked them to support the re-location application to Townsville City Council.

"Council received more than 4,000 letters of support for the new site and only 119 letters of objection," Joe said.

The club now has uncontested approval to build on its site, but that's not something that's going to happen in the next day or two.

With a price tag of between \$20 million and \$25 million for the re-location project - including the cost of the land - the current premises must be sold first.

On-going council re-construction work on the Flinders Street Mall is expected to be finished before March next vear.

That's when the club premises will be put on the market.

Joe is confident that the property, which the club bought in 2005 after leasing it since 2001, will find a ready buyer.

"This is an ideal redevelopment site," he says. "It's about 5,500 square meters with two street frontages on a corner block in the middle of the CBD that is zoned to go over 10 storeys.

Joe's enjoying the challenge up north

In thoroughbred racing parlance, Joe Kelly comes from a winning stable, with a top trainer.

He began his Club Industry career at the Logan Diggers Club on Brisbane's south side in 1993, under the watchful eve of CEO Pam Shelton.

Pam soon recognised the young man's potential and quickly promoted him to Duty Manager, then to Marketing Manager and Gaming Manager.

By 2005, Joe was ready to spread his wings and, with Pam's blessing, he took on the General Manager role at the prestigious Cazalys Australian Football Club at Cairns in far north Queensland.

Two years ago, a tempting offer saw him move a little south to Townsville.

Since he took over at the Cowboys, he has gained approval to increase the number of gaming machines there from 156 to 220, under changes to the Queensland Gaming Machine Act that require clubs to buy the entitlements for

new machines. The club has 185 machines on the floor.

Turnover during Joe's first year of tenure was \$15.75 million - up by 6.25% on the previous year.

Membership has climbed steadily from just under 22,000 when he first arrived to more than 24,000. "We will finish this year with between 25,000 and 26,000 members," Joe said confidently.

Joe Kelly has been acutely aware of the need to keep constantly in touch with what's happening in the world of licensed clubs.

He has attended many industry conferences, seminars and training courses during his years as a senior club executive.

And therein lies his one regret in an otherwise fulfilling job. "Unfortunately, living in far north Queensland restricts my attendance to industry events because so few travel to here," he said.

Once it's sold we will lease back the building and start construction on the new site."

He expects building to begin in the 2012-2013 financial year, with the new club ready for business by the end of 2013.

It's not often that councils and their bureaucrats receive bouquets rather than brick-bats on issues of building applications, but Joe is happy with his local council's attitude to the club's plans.

"To their credit, the Townsville City Council has been very good to deal with," he says. "The Cowboys bring \$80 million annually into the Townsville community, so the council understands that we need to remain a strong and viable entity to ensure the Cowboys remain a strong and viable football club."

Townsville is a growth city [The city's population grew by 5,606 or 3.2% to 181,743 in the year to June 2009, according to figures from the Australian Bureau of Statistics That's

well serviced by licensed club, so the contest for the recreational dollar is fierce.

Locals have the choice of three large clubs, including the Cowboys. The Townsville RSL Club and Brothers Leagues Club are the other two venues in the mix.

But the Cowboys club appears to be more than holding its own.

"We were voted 'Best Club in North Queensland' in this year's Clubs Queensland Achievement Awards," Joe says with an understandable hint of pride.

Dogs secure pokies venue

The Western Bulldogs AFL Club will spend nearly \$1 million on a new gaming venue that will further secure the club's financial future. The Dogs are taking control of the Dromana-Red Hill RSL Club on the Mornington Peninsula after it was forced to close in July due to financial issues. It is believed the Bulldogs will double the amount of poker machines at the 900-member venue from 20 to 40 after reopening on September 23, with a facelift planned before summer. "We will give some thought as to whether we can put more [machines] in there, but that's not an immediate thing," Western Bulldogs CEO Campbell Rose said. "Our core business is football ... however you do need to develop alternative revenue streams that insulate you from the vagaries of on-field performance." The RSL club purchase comes five months after the Bulldogs were stripped of gaming income by former Carlton director and poker machine mogul Bruce Mathieson. Mr Mathieson stunned the Bulldogs in April by transferring the lease on the Victoria Inn in Williamstown - that was controlled by the club - to the Calrlton Blues.

The Victoria Inn is owned by the powerful Mathieson-Woolworths venture. But the Dromana-Red Hill RSL Club has emerged as the ideal replacement.

It is believed the Bulldogs will change the venue's name to the Peninsula Club, or the Dromana Club, with Mr Rose describing the purchase as a "very good win-win" for the AFL club and the community. "We've got a partnership with RSL Victoria and, when venues like this come up, and in the event it works then we look at them, but it's got to suit everybody," he said. Sub-branch President Lindsay Edgerton was overjoyed that the Bulldogs had saved the RSL club. "We were in the process of closing and this has come out of left-field," Mr Edgerton said. "The Western Bulldogs have bent over backwards to help us out as a sub-branch and from the situation we were in. we were gone. They have been fantastic for us. It's just great."

Mr Edgerton said the RSL club still would operate as a sub-branch within the newly controlled club and would retain its boardroom for operational purposes.
